INTRODUCTION

The Quarterly Report is a comprehensive report designed to provide the Southern Chester County Regional Public Safety Commissioners, Managers, Command Staff and other readers a wide-ranging perspective of the activities and experiences of the organization during the established timeframe.

The report is a collective effort, primarily produced by the Chief of Police and Command Staff. The report is broken down into the four functional categories of the organization. Towards the end of every functional area, the writer is required to provide a projection of upcoming events, activities or other noteworthy matters. Finally, the report will attempt to follow a standard format, but accepts that the contents may evolve as the organization does.

Executive Division

The Executive Division is overseen by the Chief of Police. The Executive Division is responsible for the operational components, personnel, administrative, budgetary, and personnel matters in the organization.

The Executive Division is staffed with an Administrative Assistant, Records Custodian, Manager, that serves as a liaison to the Public Safety Commissioners, and the Command Staff Officers, that oversee each operational division.

Special Operations Division

The Special Operations Division is overseen by the Deputy Chief. The Special Operations Division is responsible for Criminal Investigations, Special Investigations, Community Services, Training, Staff Services, and Professional Standards. The Special Operations Division is assisted by the Chief's Administrative Assistant who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is overseen by the Sergeant. The Patrol Division is responsible for all Field Operations and is the direct supervisor of the Platoon Corporals. The Patrol Division is assisted by the Chief's Records Custodian who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

EXECUTIVE DIVISION

The following is a summary of activity performed by personnel assigned to the Executive Division during the 2nd quarter of 2018.






BIASED BASED POLICING

The following data and information is the result of an interview Chief Gerald R. Simpson had with Jonathan Lai from Philly.com in the spring of 2017 on the subject of biased policing, profiling and the data collection efforts police departments undertake to better understand their officers' contacts during a traffic stop and the subsequent enforcement action taken.

Chief Simpson is an ardent supporter of the President's Task Force 21st Century's Policing recommendations and believes the information enclosed throughout this report is in harmony with the six pillars, in particular Pillar #1 --- Building Trust and Legitimacy.

The below charts captured from Towncharts.com state that according to the most recent demographics data available from the Census Bureau released in December of 2017 the breakdown for New Garden Township and West Grove Borough are as follows:



During the 2nd Quarter of 2018, the Southern Chester Regional Police Department stopped a total of **909** motorists. Of the total traffic stops, an average of 76% concluded with an enforcement action. The following is an analysis of the demographics.

2018 BUDGET COMMENTARY

The following is a summary to highlight the manageable areas of the 2018 budget; these numbers are as of June 30, 2018.

Part-time Salary – 01-410-144:

\$220,000.00 was budgeted for 2018 part-time salary expenses. To date, \$105,337.50 to pay for 4,184.75 hours has been disbursed. This represents 48% of the budget.

Overtime Expenses – 01-410-183:

\$50,000.00 was budgeted for 2018 overtime expenses. To date, \$33,881.62 for 778 hours has been disbursed for various reasons. Thirty-two (32%) of this category remains. However, when you factor in the reimbursable extra-duty overtime, only sixteen percent (16%) of the overtime hours were used towards police department activity. It should also be noted that \$53,319.79 was brought in as revenue to pay for \$25,805.40 of extra-duty overtime or a \$27,514.39 profit margin.

Fleet Maintenance – 01-410-250:

\$20,000.00 was budgeted for vehicle repair expenses. To date, \$12,409.23 or sixty-two percent (62%) has been disbursed. A total of seventy-two (72) purchase orders have been authorized, by far the busiest line item category. This category is in jeopardy of exceeding budgetary constraints; it will be closely monitored during the remaining quarters.

Contracted Services – 01-410-450:

\$42,000.00 was budgeted for contracted services expenses. To date, \$24,024.08 or fifty-seven percent (57%) has been disbursed. A total of thirty-four (34) purchase orders have been authorized. This category is financially stable.

COPS Hiring Award:

The department received a COPS Hiring award for \$125,000.00 over a span of three-years. \$43,547.00 was budgeted to drawdown to offset the expenses of hiring a new police officer. In the 2nd Quarter, a payment request was submitted for \$10,886.97.

Revenues:

The total revenue generated through the second quarter is \$118,504.38; see data below for breakdown:

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Administrative Shift Coverages

The Special Operations Division cooperates with the Patrol Operations Division by assisting with uniformed patrol coverages. This not only maintains a balanced budget, but also to ensure adequate staffing during peak leave request periods. This scheduling adjustment maintains a healthy stewardship over the overtime and part-time police officers budget areas. During the 2nd quarter, the SOD mitigated overtime costs by working 165 hours of shift coverage.

Quality of Life

Speed Studies

SOD personnel support Patrol Division efforts by deploying the Department's JAMAR speed recording device at various locations throughout both communities. This is done both to corroborate citizen complaints about speeding and to proactively identify trouble spots where target enforcement details can then be scheduled.

Special Operations Division Proactive Enforcement

When not assisting with patrol coverage obligations or Community Service events, the Community Services Unit supplements patrol sector efforts with proactive traffic enforcement and targeted enforcement. In the 2nd quarter of 2018, SOD personnel contributed as follows:

- Traffic Citations: 59
- Written Warnings: 9
- Parking Tickets: 7



Professional Standards

A Use of Force Committee is put together each quarter to review all incidents submitted during that time period. The Deputy Chief serves as the committee chair person. On July 17th, 2018, a Use of Force review board was convened and the following incidents were reviewed:

The below Use of Force reports were submitted to document the destruction of an animal during the first quarter. After thorough review, the reports were found to be in compliance with policy.

Animal Destruction:

1. RD-18-001038

The below incidents are circumstances where a force option was used and the officer's actions were found to be in compliance after review:

RD-18-001065: While investigating the report of a suspicion condition involving males knocking on residential doors, police located the suspect vehicle, occupied by a rear seat passenger, parked next to a house. Police then observed the two described subjects committing a burglary of a camper parked on the property. The officer pulled his Department issued firearm and ordered the suspects out of the camper and on to the ground. Three (3) suspects exited the camper. Two complied with the officer's instructions but one fled on foot. The three remaining suspects (including the one in the vehicle) were taken into custody and turned over to the State Police. The fourth suspect was later apprehended with the assistance of the SCCRPD.

RD-18-001520: While police were attempting to arrest a wanted felon, the suspect attempted to drive away. Police pulled their Department issued firearm and ordered the suspect to put the vehicle in park and raise his hands. The suspect complied and was taken into custody.

RD-18-001640: Police had to use physical force, in the form of a compliance hold, in order to effect the arrest of a DUI suspect who was physically resisting the officer's efforts to place him into custody. The suspect was not injured.

Professional Standards Investigation (PSI)

Internal Affairs Investigation (IAD): This category typically involves an alleged violation of Department Policy and requires an Internal Affairs Investigation be conducted.

Supervisory Inquiry (SI): This category involves minor performance deficiencies or citizen complaints that don't rise to the level of an IAD investigation and that usually can be remedied at the first line supervisory level.

Department Vehicle Accident (DVA): Department Vehicle collisions are investigated to ensure that policies are being adhered to and to ensure that performance deficiencies are addressed to prevent future occurrences.

Source of Allegation

Internal: The origin of the allegation is from an employee of the police department, township, or borough.

External: The origin of the allegation is from a non-employee.

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION UNIT

Significant Activity

Analysis of crime reporting data in 2nd quarter of 2018 identified the following cases or crime trends as being noteworthy:

Theft

The CIU followed up on the August 2017 theft of vintage, antique tractors and related equipment, valued at over \$22,000.00. A suspect was identified and the stolen property was traced to a scrap yard in Philadelphia, where additional evidence of the transaction was obtained. An arrest warrant for the suspect was obtained on May 24th and he was picked up weeks later, after a car stop. The case is pending court. Unfortunately, the stolen equipment/tractors were not recovered, as they were likely put on a ship headed overseas within days of the crime occurring.

Burglary

The CIU is actively investigating a commercial burglary that occurred at a convenience store on June 30th. The actor gained entry to the business through the ceiling and attempted to break into an ATM safe inside the store. The method of operation is rather unique and since this investigation is still active, no additional details or specifics are being shared.

Patrol Assist – Follow Up:

The CIU assists the patrol unit with cases that, because of their nature or the amount of investigative follow up that is required, make it impractical for patrol to follow up. These include high dollar theft and fraud cases and those cases involving interviews or evidence collection out of the area. Additionally, the Special Operations Division has the ability to deploy resources such as specialized equipment, technology, and personnel to address trends in crime and augment the patrol function.

Solicitor Vetting

The CIU conducted approx. a dozen background checks of solicitors who had applied for permits, in New Garden Township, in the 2nd quarter. These involve police report database inquiries, Megan's Law Registry checks, etc. and are done to ensure the safety of our residents.

Criminal Investigation Unit Update

Cpl. Jason Ward is assigned to the CIU as the primary investigator. He receives investigative assistance and technical support from Det. Stephen Madonna, who performs CIU, CSU, and Intelligence functions. Additionally, P.O. Richard Townsend provides CIU coverage when both investigators are unavailable, due to training or court, and he provides assistance with forensic expertise and evidence processing.

Training

- Cpl. Ward and Det. Madonna attended the week-long FBI Intercounty Detective School, which is a course of study in the law enforcement techniques and procedures applicable to the duties of an investigator.
- Deputy Chief King, joined Chief Simpson and Sergeant Greenwalt, at the three-day FBINA MD/DE Re-Trainer conference in Ocean City, MD.
- Cpl. Ward attended “Advanced Practical Homicide Investigation”, a week-long seminar held in State College.
- Det. Madonna attended the three-day “Intelligence Liaison Officer Program” training which was sponsored by the Pennsylvania State Police and held in State College.
- Cpl. Ward and Det. Madonna periodically attend information sharing meetings, both in the county and in neighboring states. These meetings are a great networking opportunity and place to gain input and insight on active investigations. Additionally, these meetings are often geared towards a particular topic or crime trend and are attended by investigators at all levels of law enforcement and even the private sector.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

During the 2nd quarter of 2018, the Community Services Unit has engaged with the public and our area youth by participating in the following programs and events:

Good Citizenship Award

On April 6th, Pfc. Raimato recognized two Kennett High School Students with “Good Citizenship Awards” for stopping to assist an elderly man that was wearing pajamas and was staggering along Route 82, near the high school. They saw that he was bleeding from the head so they pulled over. They called 911 and remained with the man until help arrived. The awards, along with \$50.00 Gift Cards to Game Stop, were presented at a small ceremony at the Kennett High School. School officials and the boys’ parents were in attendance.

April 12, 2018 - Held to remember victims of homicide and law enforcement officers fallen in the line of duty.

Avon Grove Little League Opening Day 2018

On April 21st, Pfc. Raimato took part in the opening day celebrations by having an information table and handing out numerous giveaways to the kids.

14th Annual DEA National Drug Take Back

On April 28th, the SCCRPD held prescription drug drop off events at two locations: The Giant Food Store in New Garden Township and the West Grove Borough Municipal Building. Turnout was brisk and collection amounts exceeded the previous year. We even made the front page of the April 30th edition of the Daily Local News!

Brandywine Backyard BBQ

On April 29th, the CSU took part in the Inaugural Brandywine Backyard BBQ Festival hosted by the Chester County Council of the Boy Scouts of America. We gave both children and adults the opportunity to experience the impairing effects that drugs and alcohol can have on driving, though the use of our “Drunk Cart” and simulator goggles. We had the drivers run through a cone course, with and without the goggles, and the difference was quite apparent. This was a very popular attraction at the event and we believe that both the participants and the spectators took away some valuable lessons from the experience.

Kennett Middle School Career Day

Pfc. Raimato took part in the KMS Career Day held on May 10th. His presentation was very well received by the students.

National Police Week – Law Enforcement Appreciation Service

SCCRPD members joined officers from the Kennett Square Borough and Kennett Township Police Department, at a May 20th church service hosted by the Unionville Presbyterian Church

and officiated by Pastor Annalie Korengel, who serves as the Police Chaplain for all three departments.

Wine and Wheels

SOD/CSU members, interns, and Command Staff attended the Wine and Wheels - First Responder Appreciation event, hosted by New Garden Township and held at the New Garden Township Park on May 23rd. The Avondale Fire Company was represented and a K9 Unit from the Chester County Sheriff's Department gave a demonstration.

Broad Run Ridge HOA

Deputy Chief King attended the Broad Run Ridge Home Owner's Association Meeting held at the New Garden Township Building on May 24th. The topic of our regionalization and its positive impact on crime, traffic, and quality of life issues was discussed.

Memorial Day Parade

The SCCRPD was proud to take part in the Annual Avon-Grove Memorial Day Parade in West Grove Borough. Marked patrol cars, tossing out candy to the kids, led the parade and brought up the rear, and Bike Patrol officers roved throughout, engaging with the public. Except for a minor medical incident that was attributed to the heat, there were no issues.

Boy Scouts of America

On June 7, 2018, Pfc. Raimato took part in BSA Troop 191's Eagle Scout Board of Review.

Garage Youth Center



Technology Making a Difference

SCCRPD Unmanned Aircraft System (U.A.S.) Update



During the 2nd quarter of 2018, the Phantom was used, quite skillfully, to map the interior of the Kennett Middle School, in support of Active Threat Response Training. Additionally, it was used to support a wooden terrain search for one of four suspects who had fled the scene of a burglary interrupted by an SCCRPD patrol officer.

Internship Program

The SCCRPD took on three (3) college interns this quarter. The program is managed by both Deputy Chief King and Administrative Assistant Sandra Lutz. Local resident Patricia Rea attends the Youth Technical Institute (YTI) in Lancaster. Michael McCardle and Steven Boyer both attend West Chester University. The three are required to complete an average of 400 hours of unpaid internship, in order to receive college credits or in some cases to graduate. This program will be updated with the results of their completed internships in the 3rd Quarter Report.








