Introduction

The Quarterly Report is a comprehensive report designed to provide the Southern Chester County Regional Public Safety Commissioners, Managers, Command Staff, and other readers a wide-ranging perspective of the activities and experiences of the organization, during the established timeframe.

The report is a collective effort, primarily produced by the Chief of Police and Command Staff. The report is broken down into the four functional categories of the organization. Towards the end of every functional area, the writer is required to provide a projection of upcoming events, activities or other noteworthy matters. The report will attempt to follow a standard format, but accepts that the contents may evolve as the organization does. Finally, the reader may not understand industry jargon or graphs. In these cases, we respectfully invite the reader to contact us for clarification.

Executive Division

The Executive Division is overseen by the Chief of Police. The Executive Division is responsible for the operational components, personnel, administrative, budgetary, and personnel matters in the organization.

The Executive Division is staffed with an Executive Assistant, Records Administrator, Manager, that serves as a liaison to the Public Safety Commissioners, and the Command Staff Officers, that oversee each operational division.

Special Operations Division

The Special Operations Division is overseen by the Deputy Chief. The Special Operations Division is responsible for Criminal Investigations, Intelligence and Support, Community Services, Training, Staff Services, and Professional Standards. The Special Operations Division is assisted by the Chief's Executive Assistant who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is overseen by the Lieutenant. The Patrol Division is responsible for all Field Operations and is the direct supervisor of the Platoon Corporals. The Patrol Division is assisted by the Chief's Records Administrator who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

Executive Division

The following is a summary of activity including established goals performed by personnel assigned to the Executive Division during the 2nd Quarter of 2019.

Goals – Progress Update

1. Establish with the cooperation of the Police Association, a Labor and Management committee.
Purpose: The objective is to proactively identify and address non-contractual issues or challenges faced by the department.

Status: The Labor and Management teams have met once in the 2nd Quarter to discuss the following issues:

1st Quarter Update:

Biometric health screenings for police officers: Delayed to 2020

The formation of an Honor Guard Unit: An HGU was formed and has received initial training. Uniform funding for the HGU was secured through a donation from the D’Amico Family.

2nd Quarter Issues:

Minimum Staffing Requirements: 2020 Budget Discussion

Hiring Process and Promotion Process: A hiring process was completed in the 2nd quarter. A promotion process is being considered for the 4th quarter.

PLEAC Accreditation Process: New policies being implemented were discussed, to include Command Development, Body-worn Cameras, Body Alterations & Tattoos and Giglio.

2020 Budget Overview: General Discussion

A third meeting will be scheduled in the 3rd Quarter to address any new issues and to update or close the aforementioned matters.

2. Establish a multi-disciplined community advisory committee for the National Night Out.
Purpose: Our objective will be to solicit input from our community partners to better represent the mission of the annual National Night Out event.

Status: The Command Staff and Managers, met with several community partners to discuss the upcoming National Night Out event on August 6th. A second meeting was not held in the 2nd quarter. Due to time constraints, the NNO coordinator along with her team prioritized the organizational and implementation process.

3. Create a template for a 7-week Citizens' Police Academy. **Purpose:** Design and budget for a citizens' police academy for our residents to create a better understanding of the law enforcement role which will improve relations and our image.

Status: No change in status; this is a budget and 4th quarter objective.

4. Host an Open House for the new police facility. **Purpose:** To welcome and offer thanks to the public for their support for the new police facility.

Status: No change in status; this is a budget and 3rd quarter objective.

5. Direct appropriate resources to complete a detailed analysis and then report with recommendations on the following public safety concerns. **Purpose:** Our objective is to better understand these community issues and direct resources and enlist our community's assistance to disrupt, disband, displace or alter behaviors that put the us at risk.

Status: An update is pending from the Special Operations and Patrol Division Commanders.

6. Create a survey to measure the community's perception. **Purpose:** Our objective will be to gain information about the community's perception of crime, traffic and public services. The information will then be used to direct resources or to better inform the communities.

Status: This objective is complete. The Executive Division used survey format from the US Department of Justice COPS Office. The format was then translated into Spanish for our Latino population. The survey was made available in a hardcopy format and as a link on our websites and social media pages. See Appendix A and B for related commentary and results.

General Orders

The Office of Accreditation continues their efforts to implement policy and to establish best practice policy for law enforcement consistent with our PLEAC accreditation process. In the 2nd Quarter, the OOA completed another 72% of the required policy and standards bringing the completion to 87%.

2019 Budget Commentary

The following is a summary to highlight the manageable areas of the 2019 budget; these numbers are accurate as of July 11, 2019.

Petty Cash Audit:

A 2nd quarter petty cash audit was performed by the Records Administrator. The nominal overage discrepancy discovered in the 1st quarter was reconciled. The accurate account of on-hand petty cash is \$477.18. Purchase Orders have been completed to account for expenses and cash deposits into the account.

Part-time Salary – 01-410-144:

\$230,000.00 was budgeted for 2019 part-time salary expenses. To date, \$125,270.61 to pay for 3,794 hours has been disbursed. This represents 54.5% of the budget category.

Overtime Expenses – 01-410-183:

\$60,000.00 was budgeted for 2019 overtime expenses. To date, \$13,381.53 for 288.5 hours has been disbursed for various reasons. This expenditure represents 22.30% of the budget category. It should be noted that \$7,702.44 of the total amount is related to an Extra Duty/Reimbursable Expense. To date, only 9.5% of the overtime budget has been used for department related activities.

Fleet Maintenance – 01-410-250:

\$25,000.00 was budgeted for fleet maintenance and repair expenses. To date, \$11,775.77 has been disbursed for a total of 64 maintenance or repair events. This expenditure represents 47.10% of the budget category.

Contracted Services – 01-410-450:

\$68,000.00 was budgeted for contracted services expenses. To date, \$37,947.71 for 54 purchase orders. This expenditure represents 55.81% of the budget category.

Grants and Awards

COPS Hiring Award:

In 2018, the department received a COPS Hiring award for \$125,000.00 over a span of three-years. A total of \$44,785.00 is scheduled to drawdown in 2019 to offset the expenses of a police officer's salary and benefits. In the 1st Quarter, a payment request was submitted for \$11,196.25; an ACH was received in April of 2019. A second and third drawdown will occur in July and October respectively.

Targeted Safe Schools - SRO Award:

In 2019, the department received a PA Department of Education award for \$60,000.00 over a span of one-year to redeploy an employee to a School Resource Officer position in the schools in New Garden Township. The Kennett Consolidated School District contributed another \$26,475.00 towards the program, which was received in total from KCSD.

In the 1st Quarter, a payment request was submitted for \$39,199.41 from the Safe School Office. In the 2nd Quarter the remaining amount totaling \$20,800.59 was invoiced. To date no payment has been received from the Department of Education. A follow-up phone call with a Department Director and Senator Dinniman's Office is pending.

Bullet Resistant Vest Award:

In the 1st Quarter, a payment request was submitted for \$2,218.00 from the Office of Justice for the purchase of four (4) bullet proof vests; an ACH deposit is pending.

In 2nd Quarter, the Executive Division completed a 2019 BVP Grant Award application. The approval is pending.

In the 2nd Quarter, a payment request was submitted for \$567.00 from the Office of Justice for the purchase of one (1) bullet proof vest; an ACH deposit is pending.

PCCD Award:

In 2018, efforts began to secure a grant for Body-Worm Camera in the amount of \$18,000.00. In April of 2019, the department received notice that we were successful in our endeavors. Plans are underway to purchase the equipment with grant and match dollars. Training of personnel will satisfy remaining match requirements with in-kind expenses.

Municipal Aid Program:

As of July 1st, our successful expansion of the Regional Police Department into Avondale Borough allows the organization to submit a MAP grant application with the PA Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED). The Executive Division will work with the Management Team to identify areas in need that are in harmony with the award requirements.

Revenues and Awards:

The total revenue or grants and awards drawdowns generated in the 2nd quarter is \$96,873.41; see data below for breakdown:

Executive Division Commentary

The following are some additional highlights from the 2nd Quarter and happenings in the 3rd Quarter!

Police Facility Update – 8934 Gap Newport Pike

The police facility has entered the final stage of construction. Primary construction work is complete except for finishing items, such as carpet, furniture and technology. Plans are underway for a ribbon cutting ceremony followed by an open house in September where the public will be invited in for a guided tour the police facility.

Avondale Borough

On June 4, 2019, the police department hosted a Town Hall Meeting at the Avondale Fire House, Station #23 to discuss expansion of police services into Avondale Borough, which became effective on July 1, 2019. Broadcast on Facebook Live and attended by numerous community members, elected officials and stakeholders, the meeting outlined the expected change in services for the residents of the Borough.

The motivation for the SCCRPD has been to positively influence the quality of life issues for their neighbor, which is contiguous to the western border of New Garden Township. Our communities share the same traffic, crime and quality of life challenges. The Southern Chester County Regional Police Department is uniquely positioned, both in proximity and as a proactive “community oriented” public safety service, to bring solutions to the challenges we face here in Southern Chester County.

Command & Leadership Academy

It is our pleasure to share that Chief Gerald R. Simpson has successfully completed and graduated from the New Jersey State Association of Chief of Police Command and Leadership Academy. The 14week leadership program traces its origins to the US Military Academy at West Point.

On May 30th, Chief Simpson attended the 54th graduation ceremony with sixty-one other students from around the northeast coast. In addition to graduating, Chief Gerald R. Simpson has been invited back to the Academy to become a program instructor.

Rekindling the Warrior Spirit

A career in public safety presents challenges to the human spirit, and every shift depletes an officer's spirituality in a way that is unique to the career. Without an effective way to replenish that supply of spirituality, it is possible to end up in "spiritual overdraft," or, worse, "spiritual bankruptcy" ... and that's when officers hurt themselves, the people around them, and the honor of the profession.

The Executive Division has been working and planning for months to host a seminar for their officers and invited guests. This seminar provides spiritual fortification for officers, and offers a practical guide to restoring inner peace and clarity. Jam packed with exercises, tools, and insights, "*Spiritual Survival for Law Enforcement*" nourishes the soul of the first responder and replenishes his or her reservoir of idealism and spirituality. A **'must attend'** for all new and seasoned officers!

About the speaker...

Chaplain Cary A. Friedman is a lecturer on matters of stress-management and police ethics for law enforcement officers. A prison, hospital, and police chaplain, he began consulting to the FBI's Behavioral Science Unit in Quantico, VA in 2001. The author of *Spiritual Survival for Law Enforcement* (Compass Books, 2005), Friedman has consulted to and spoken at numerous agencies and conferences, including the FBI's National Academy, FBI Training Network (FBITN), International Conference of Police Chaplains (ICPC), Connecticut DPS, State of NJ Cop2Cop and Texas DPS, and has appeared on The History Channel.

2019 National Night Out

After 7 months of planning and coordination, the Southern Chester County Regional Police Department is pleased to host our third National Night Out event on Tuesday, August 6th from 6:00 to 8:00 pm in each of our represented communities:

360 Degree Evaluation

In the 2nd Quarter, the Command Staff officers underwent an anonymous 360-degree evaluation. The Command Staff was evaluated in 11 areas identified as essential qualities of an effective leadership. The categories were as follows: Leadership, Communication, Motivation, Delegating, Positivity, Trustworthiness, Creativity, Feedback, Responsibility, Commitment and Flexibility.

As evidenced by the results, the Command Staff will endeavor to improve upon communication, feedback and positivity. This exercise will be performed on an annual basis and is instrumental in providing feedback for how we are performing our leadership responsibilities.

Biased Based Policing

Figure 10: West Grove, Chester County, Pennsylvania, PA Hispanic Population




Figure 11: Male vs. Female Population





Figure 9: West Grove, Chester County, Pennsylvania, PA and Area Racial Makeup








Event Count by Type




Event Count by Municipality



Core Values in Action

Supervisor Notations are internal reports filed by ranking officers who have either identified a positive interaction between a police officer and the public or have been informed of a job well done. Supervisor notations are a certain way to letting the department's police officers know that leadership is paying attention to actions which are considered going above and beyond to honor our values and philosophy. The notations are added in the officers personnel file for permanent record.

#19-01

On 05/23/2019 at 0030 hrs., P.O. Ben Brown was on patrol in the 9100 block of Gap Newport Road, when he observed a Honda passenger car parked unoccupied and covered with weeds in an attempt of camouflage on the PREIT property far from the road. P.O. Brown stationed himself in the area and soon after observed the suspect vehicle pull out onto Gap Newport Pike with its lights out. P.O. Brown attempted to catch up to the vehicle intending to conduct a traffic stop but lost sight of the vehicle, (no emergency lights had been used at this point yet.) While canvassing the area P.O. Brown again observed the suspect vehicle north bound on Kaolin Road, turned around to conduct a traffic stop. The suspect vehicle operator seeing P.O. Brown turned his lights out again and quickly pulled into a private driveway in an attempt to elude P.O. Brown.

P.O. Brown did not fall for this, conducted the traffic stop and the suspect was arrested for 3802D Act 64 related. During the traffic stop P.O. Brown observed items leading him to believe the suspect was not only consuming but also growing/cultivating Act 64 possibly on the PREIT property.

Several days later P.O. Brown spoke with Det S. Madonna and requested he assist with searching the highly rough and over grown terrain using the department owned drone. On 5/28/2019 at 1630 hrs a search was conducted of the PREIT property area using the drone.

By use of the drone not visible from any "common" vantage point Det Madonna discovered a small area far inside the highly dense and overgrown section of the PREIT property being used for growing marijuana. Not only did Det. Madonna discover the marijuana plants but upon closer inspection with the drone discovered the same defendant from the previous DUI was also on scene.

Det Madonna notified units which included PO Brown, PO Smith and PO Sullivan of the situation and guided them towards the defendant.

The defendant observing the drone, and hearing/seeing oncoming officers grabbed multiple marijuana plants and ran from the scene.

Officers gave foot chase during which time one officer fell down an approx. 4-foot embankment causing a scraped bruised knee and during which all officers received minor cuts and scrapes.

Officers not giving up, continued to pursue the suspect and did finally take the suspect into custody.

Along with the defendant officers also confiscated growing materials, water tanks, a large water bladder, a gas-powered electric generator and assorted equipment being used by the suspect.

It was also found that due to officers finding his vehicle earlier the defendant had parked his vehicle this time on Springbenny Turn attempting to avoid detection, which is a considerable distance from where his growing operation was located.

Defendant also admitted to have been discovered and chased on foot weeks earlier by P.O. Sullivan in the area of Sunnyside Road which is in the general area of the PREIT property.

The investigation is continuing and officers are running down additional leads.

I want to commend P.O. Brown along with Officers Smith, Sullivan and Madonna. PO Brown sensing criminal activity did not just move on after the initial DUI arrest which would have been the easiest thing to do, but instead continued to investigate.

P.O. Brown coordinated with P.O. Madonna for use of the department drone and when the situation took a dramatic turn ALL members came together and were able to take the suspect into custody without serious injury to them OR the suspect.

I believe this is a good example of the quality officers we have at SCCRPD and wish to commend P.O. Brown for going the extra mile resulting in the arrest and discovery of the growing area. I also wish to commend Det Madonna, P.O. Smith and P.O. Sullivan on how well they worked together to also facilitate the arrest.

On 06/04/2019, P.O. Sullivan, PFC Cooper and P.O. Krissinger were attending a Town Hall Meeting at Station 23. P.O. Sullivan was approached by a gentleman who had received a notification on his cellular phone regarding a possible shooting at 225 Ellicott Road, London Grove Township. It was later discovered that State Police had already been dispatched since the call was in their jurisdiction. SCCRPD officers left Station 23 and proceeded toward the incident to assist if needed.

As SCCRPD officers arrived in the area of the call, they were summoned to the intersection to Rt. 41 and Ellicott Avenue to stage with PSPA Troopers.

At 1935 hrs, while assisting with a DOA at 222 Ellicott Road, Cpl. Joseph Versagli, received a call from CCPR requesting that he call in. He was informed that PSP had requested SCCRPD assistance and to meet at Rt. 41 and Ellicott Avenue

Once at Ellicott and 41 P.O. Sullivan and Cpl. Versagli informed PSP units that a perimeter had been set around the residence in question by SCCRPD officers who were equipped with threat level III ballistic vests, Patrol rifles and ballistic shields. Cpl. Versagli was able to obtain additional information from Trooper Burgwald who informed him that they had received a call from a child informing them that their father had shot their mother and had strapped a bomb to himself and that he and his mother were now barricaded in the bathroom. P.O. Sullivan, met with Avondale 23 fire Chief, Steve Cole, and requested they shut down Rt. 41 at Ellicott Ave and Ellicott Road and Cooper Road and Ellicott Road and Garden Station Road. This was done to ensure the safety of motorist and pedestrian traffic that may have otherwise been put in harm's way by entering an active scene. P.O. Sullivan and Cpl. Versagli then made contact with PSPA Lieutenant Swantner who rode with P.O. Sullivan to the area of 222 Ellicott Road. Cpl. Versagli then requested all radio traffic be moved to a secondary channel and to be patched in with PSP to ensure efficient communication between the two departments. Cpl. Versagli then requested county radio to notify me of the reported shooting and now possible barricaded persons per department protocol.

Once all units went back to the scene, P.O. Krissinger and Cpl. Versagli reestablished a perimeter to the rear of the residence behind cover. P.O. Sullivan assisted with establishing an incident command post with Lt. Swantner of PSP and three of their troopers. PFC Cooper, also equipped with a patrol rifle and threat vest, covered the front and side of the residence using a patrol vehicle as cover. P.O. Blue and P.O. Walsh assisted with perimeter on the North sides of the residence. P.O. Sullivan coordinated all communications between PSP and SCCRPD units who worked through sound tactical solutions to make sure all officers and troopers on scene were positioned safely and were properly equipped for their assignment. I arrived with PFC Raimato and we began direct communications with PSP Lt. Swantner at the command post. Troopers were instructed to gather intel from the landlord of the property who provided them with phone numbers for relatives. At the same time, officers began to use the police vehicle's public announcement system to hale for the residents of the suspect property to open the door and exit the residence. The assistance of P.O. Stephen Madonna was requested so that he could deploy the department's Unmanned Aircraft to hover over the property to gather information as a tactical entry was being planned.

PFC Raimato cleared the scene to respond to a domestic situation where a door to a residence was found unsecured under suspicious conditions. He was assisted at that scene by Kennett Square Police Department.

A female exited the suspect residence and officers used the PA system to get her to walk towards the command post for questioning. Once contact was made with the female, it was discovered that she was the female who was named as being shot in the initial call to police. The female was interviewed for all relative information and cell phones were used to get her two children out of the house. Once

all occupants were safely removed from the residence, P.O. Sullivan, equipped with a ballistic threat vest and shield, along with Troopers, made entry into the suspect residence to clear for threats and check for possible injured victims. The house was cleared without incident and the incident was confirmed as a swatting call.

This Supervisor's Notation was filed to point out several factors and actions taken by the Police Officers mentioned that made this incident a successful joint operation. The initial call dispatched to Police and Medical personnel contained information that lead them to believe there was a shooting victim, a juvenile in immediate danger and a man armed with a gun and an explosive device. SCCRPD officers had to think swiftly and act based off of information that lead them to believe several human lives were at risk.

To Police Officers Krissing, Blue, Walsh, Sullivan, Steve Madonna, Raimato, Cooper and Cpl. Versagli, and on behalf of your Command Staff who were present to see you in action, THANK YOU!!!! The residents of the communities we serve should sleep soundly knowing the most professional and dedicated team of police officers are at their service.

Special Operations Division

Administrative Shift Coverages

The Special Operations Division (which includes, the Criminal Investigations Unit, the Tactical Intelligence and Support Unit, and the Community Services Unit) cooperates with the Patrol Operations Division by assisting with uniformed patrol coverages. This not only maintains a balanced budget, but also ensures adequate staffing during peak leave request periods. This scheduling adjustment maintains a healthy stewardship over the overtime and part-time police officers budget areas. During the 2nd quarter of 2019, the SOD was not required to provide shift coverage, however, Det. Madonna did assist with two days of Patrol Rifle Training in May.

Quality of Life

SOD Proactive Enforcement

The Tactical Intelligence and Support Unit augments patrol efforts by conducting surveillance and deploying resources in response to citizen complaints about crime, drug activity, and traffic violations.

Professional Standards

- There were no Internal Affairs Investigations during the 2nd quarter of 2019.
- There were no Department Vehicle Accidents during the 2nd quarter of 2019.
- There were no Supervisory Inquiries initiated in the 2nd quarter of 2019. One matter from the 1st quarter was completed.

2nd Quarter Use of Force Report & Review

A Use of Force Committee is put together each quarter to review all incidents submitted during that time period. The Deputy Chief serves as the committee chair person. On July 8, 2019, a Use of Force review board was convened and the following incidents were reviewed:

The below Use of Force reports were submitted to document the destruction of an injured animal during the 2nd quarter. After thorough review, these reports were found to be in compliance with policy.

1. [RD-19-001112](#) (Deer)
2. [RD-19-001485](#) (Opossum)

The below incidents are circumstances where a **force option** was used and the officer's actions were found to be in compliance with Department Policy after review:

1. [RD-19-001120](#): Police initiated a traffic stop of a suspect known to have an active warrant for a domestic violence incident. It had been reported to police that this subject was known to carry

a firearm. When police approached the vehicle, the passenger had her hands in the air but the driver/suspect's hands were not visible. The officer drew his issued service weapon and ordered the suspect out of the car. Once the suspect was out of the car and was entirely visible, the officer holstered his weapon and took the suspect into custody without incident.

2. **RD-19-001158:** Police initiated a traffic stop of a vehicle for a registration violation. When the driver was asked to pull forward to allow vehicles access to a driveway he was blocking, he got aggressive and refused to move. When the officer approached the vehicle, the driver suddenly fled at a high rate of speed. The driver was eventually pulled over approx. a half mile from the initial stop. He continued to be uncooperative and aggressive to the officer. When the driver threw open his car door in an aggressive manner and tried to exit the vehicle, the officer advised him that he was now under arrest and ordered him to place his hands behind his back. The driver refused and began to physically resist arrest. He was taken to the ground and continued to resist. When he refused to give the officer his other arm, which was concealed under his body, several knee strikes were used by the officer to gain compliance. Additional units arrived and the driver was taken into custody without further incident. However, when he was seated in the rear of the patrol car, he continued to thrash around. He did suffer abrasions to his face, hands, and knee as a result of the incident but refused medical treatment. He was charged with drug violations and resisting arrest.
3. **RD-19-001241:** Police responded to the report of a domestic disturbance between a husband and wife. Chester County Police Radio advised that the male actor had multiple firearms in a bedroom and was in that bedroom with access to said firearms. When police arrived, they met the reporting party outside. Police were advised that the male was flipping out and destroying the house. The officer could hear a commotion inside of the attached garage and saw evidence of items and broken glass strewn about the property. The officer located the male inside the garage and when police requested that he come outside to speak with them, he became belligerent and advanced towards the officer in an aggressive manner. When he refused orders to stop and get on the ground, the officer drew his issued service weapon. The male continued to ignore commands and continued to advance. The officer transitioned to his Taser and ordered the male to the ground. He complied and was taken into custody.
4. **RD-19-001384:** Police were called to a residence for an emotional disorder involving a juvenile male. It was reported that a verbal argument with a parent had turned physical and that the juvenile had now retreated to his bedroom and was holding the door shut. At the parent's request that the child, be taken to the hospital for evaluation police assisted EMS personnel in physically escorting him into the ambulance. In the process, the juvenile attempted to resist by grabbing a hold of objects and trying to trip the officer but no injuries were sustained.
5. **RD-19-000723:** Officers were investigating the site of a suspected marijuana growing operation, when they encountered the suspect on site and in the midst of tending to his crop. When the suspect noticed police, he fled through the wooded terrain. When an officer observed him hiding under a tree, knowing that the violation that the suspect was fleeing from was a felony and having knowledge of the suspect's criminal history, the officer drew his issued service weapon and ordered the suspect not to move. Instead, the suspect fled again and was pursued by additional officers. A second officer was able to cut the suspect off as he crested a hill and

upon seeing that he was not holding anything in his hands, drew his issued Taser and ordered the suspect to the ground. This time the suspect complied. He was taken into custody and was charged accordingly. Both weapons were only displayed and no injuries resulted.

Significant Activity

Analysis of crime reporting data in the 2nd quarter of 2019 identified the following cases or crime trends as being noteworthy:

- [Transmission of Sexually Explicit Images by Minor \(Arrest Update\)](#): This investigation, which originated from a CY 47/Childline Report in January, involved multiple juveniles suspected of transmitting nude photographs via text message. It was brought to a close with the arrest of four (4) juveniles in May.
- [OD–Deaths](#): The CIU investigated two suspected drug overdose deaths on consecutive days in June. One victim was a 54 year-old male and the other was a 35 year-old male. The incidents occurred at separate locations and do not appear to be connected to the same source. The Cause of Death for each is still pending the results of Toxicology.
- [Burglary \(Arrest Update\)](#): A 38 year-old male from Avondale was charged in connection with the forced entry burglary of a residence in January. Prescription medications were stolen while the resident was away. Fingerprint evidence was obtained from the scene and was submitted to the Chester County Detectives. A comparison matched the fingerprints to a suspect who was already incarcerated on unrelated charges. An arrest warrant was obtained in June and a detainer was lodged with the prison. (Note: Det. Stephen Madonna and P.O. Richard Townsend received a Supervisor’s Notation for their investigative efforts in solving this crime).
- [Reports of Suspected Child Abuse](#): In 2nd quarter of 2019, the CIU received Fourteen (14) reports of suspected Child Abuse (physical and sexual). Eight of these were determined to be “unfounded” for criminal offenses. The remaining six cases are still under investigation.

Criminal Investigation Unit Staffing

Cpl. Jason Ward is assigned to the CIU as the primary investigator. He receives investigative assistance and technical support from Det. Stephen Madonna, who performs CIU and Intelligence functions.

Both investigators are assigned to the Chester County Municipal Drug Task Force (MDTF) and Det. Madonna is also assigned to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Task Force.

Additionally, P.O. Richard Townsend provides occasional CIU coverage when both investigators are unavailable, due to training or court, and he provides assistance with forensic expertise and evidence processing.

Crime and Intelligence Information Sharing

CIU investigators work closely with their counterparts in our neighboring jurisdictions. We share information on active investigations at monthly or bi-monthly crime meetings, which are hosted on a rotational basis. The SCCRPD hosted the May meeting and the next meeting is scheduled for July. These meetings are often attended by investigators from agencies in DE and MD, as well as by federal law enforcement agents.

Community Services Unit

School Resource Officer (SRO) Program

On November 5th, 2018, PFC Mario Raimato was re-assigned to the Special Operations Division / Community Services Unit and immediately assumed the role of our full-time School Resource Officer (SRO). He is responsible for patrolling the three Kennett Consolidated Schools that are in New Garden Township: Bancroft Elementary, New Garden Elementary, and the Kennett Middle School.

Year to date PFC Raimato has logged some 1092 hours performing SRO duties, both in the schools and at school related events. He has developed an excellent rapport with the students and the faculty. We've received positive feedback from parents and school faculty for the police presence at the schools.

Consistent with the requirements of the SRO Grant and the Unit's 2019 Goals and Objectives, the following are some examples of the activities and tasks that PFC Raimato is responsible for on a daily basis:

- Maintain a visible presence at arrivals and dismissals – primarily at the Kennett Middle School (KMS)
- Maintain a visible presence during lunches at the KMS, due to the large volume of students in the cafeteria
- Conduct periodic random checks at both elementary schools
- Participate in “Lock Down Drills” and Fire Alarm Evacuation Drills
- Facilitate conflict resolution and deterrence of criminal or delinquent activity.
- Maintain a visible presence during after school events to provide security and assist with traffic control.
- Build and foster positive relationships with students and staff to maintain open lines of communication, in an effort to thwart potential safety concerns before they manifest.
- Serve as the police department liaison with the Kennett Consolidated School District.
- Help facilitate the scheduling and implementation of “Stop the Bleeding” protocols
- Serve as the Department's point of contact for “Safe to Say Something” protocol notifications.

Awards and Recognition

- PFC Raimato received a Supervisor's Notation acknowledging his investigative efforts in quickly resolving an allegation of abuse made against a staff member of the Chester County Intermediate Unit's Safety Care Team. Because of his position as our SRO, PFC Raimato was able to gain access to the people and resources at the school that were pertinent to his investigation. After interviewing all parties involved and reviewing surveillance video of the alleged incident, he was able to quickly determine that no misconduct occurred and was able to exonerate the staff member of any wrongdoing.
- PFC Raimato received a “Clinical Save Commendation” from the Chester County Emergency Medical Services Council, Inc., dated May 23, 2019. This commendation was awarded as a result of his efforts in providing care to a patient experiencing sudden cardiac arrest, who through his


efforts, survived to hospital discharge. In addition, he received a very nice thank you note from the patient and his family.

Technology in Use

Fighting Crime from Above

The Department's Unmanned Aircraft (Drone) was used to detect a marijuana growing operation in a secluded area of property adjacent to Gap Newport Pike, in New Garden Township. On May 28th, while conducting aerial surveillance, the UA pilot, Det. Madonna, spotted the suspect actively in the process of tending to the marijuana grow. When the suspect noticed the UA, he began to flee, while pulling marijuana plants from their pots and throwing them. He ignored numerous commands to stop from officers giving chase through dangerous terrain. With the UA maintaining a visual of the situation from above, pursuing officers cut off the suspect and he was eventually taken into custody. Nine (9) suspected marijuana plants, as well as a wheel barrow, generator, gas cans, water containers, cloth pots, and trash bags filled with mushroom soil, were recovered at the scene. The suspect was charged with felony and misdemeanor charges.





Community Outreach

PFC Raimato continues to be responsible for community outreach initiatives, such as After the Bell and Eagle Scout Boards of Review, and is responsive to community requests for appearances, speeches, and tours.

During the 2nd quarter of 2019, the Community Services Unit / SRO, assisted by the Patrol Division, engaged with the public and our area youth by participating in the following programs and events or by providing security and traffic control at them:

- **Bancroft Elementary School Choral Presentation (April 4th)**
- **Kennett Middle School's Spring into Literacy Program (April 10th)**




Command and Leadership

Members of the Southern Chester County Regional Police Department would like to extend our Congratulations to P.O. Raymond Sullivan who on Friday, June 28th, successfully completed an extensive 3-week, 112-hour Level 1 Commercial Vehicle Safety Inspection Course.

The course, put on by Pennsylvania State Police, consisted of a thorough academic and hands on curriculum which focused on the day to day operation of commercial vehicle operators and the detailed mechanics regarding inspections of these types of vehicles.

Our coverage areas are home to Rt. 41, which is heavily travelled by commercial vehicles. This certification allows P.O. Survey Commentary

I want to start by thanking the US Department of Justice – COPS Office and the Executive Team for making the survey possible.

The results for the English and Spanish surveys follow this opening commentary. As promised when we initiated a survey attempting to measure our communities' perception of our services, crime issues and satisfaction the results are available for the public to view.

In total there were 142 English responses and 5 Spanish. The survey was opened on June 4th and closed on June 25th. Both versions of the survey were made available at the Town Hall event, electronically on our websites and social media pages and shared to our community stakeholders. Setting aside the results, it is clear that we have to do a better job of creating access to this effort to our Spanish speaking population.

Before I draw the reader's attention to a small sampling of the results that are of vital importance to the Southern Chester County Regional Police Department, it is worth noting that the survey taker may not be aware of whom delivers their law enforcement and public safety services. In other words, the survey responder may be talking about another police department. With this knowledge in hand whether right or wrong, it is also fair to say that law enforcement is often the recipient of a blanket judgment; if the results are derogatory then we will own it in the name of our profession.







Q3 2-3 To what extent does your law enforcement agency make it easy for community members to provide input (e.g., comments, suggestions, and concerns)?





Q8 3-3 To what extent do you feel safe in your community when you are outside alone at night?



Q9 3-4 Over the last 12 months, to what extent have your feelings of safety in your community increased, decreased, or stayed the same?














