Introduction

The report is a collective effort, primarily produced by the Chief of Police and Command Staff. The report is broken down into the four functional categories of the organization. Towards the end of every functional area, the writer is required to provide a projection of upcoming events, activities or other noteworthy matters. The report will attempt to follow a standard format, but accepts that the contents may evolve as the organization does. Finally, the reader may not understand industry jargon or graphs. In these cases, we respectfully invite the reader to contact us for clarification.

Executive Division

The Executive Division is overseen by the Chief of Police. The Executive Division is responsible for all organizational components to include; personnel, operations, administration, fiscal management and strategic planning.

The Executive Division is staffed with an Executive Assistant, Records Administrator, Manager, that serves as a liaison to the Public Safety Commissioners, and the Command Staff Officers, that oversee each operational division.

Special Operations Division

The Special Operations Division is overseen by the Deputy Chief. The Special Operations Division is responsible for Criminal Investigations, Intelligence and Support, Community Services, Training, Staff Services, and Professional Standards. The Special Operations Division is assisted by the Chief's Executive Assistant who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is overseen by the Lieutenant. The Patrol Division is responsible for all Field Operations and is the direct supervisor of the Platoon Corporals. The Patrol Division is assisted by the Chief's Records Administrator who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

Executive Division

The following is a summary of activity including established goals performed by personnel assigned to the Executive Division during the 3rd Quarter of 2019.

Goals – Progress Update

1. Establish with the cooperation of the Police Association, a Labor and Management committee.
Purpose: The objective is to proactively identify and address non-contractual issues or challenges faced by the department.

Status: To date, the Labor and Management team have met twice to discuss the following issues:

1st Quarter Update:

Biometric health screenings for police officers: Delayed to 2020

The formation of an Honor Guard Unit: An HGU was formed and has received initial training. Uniform funding for the HGU was secured through a donation from the D’Amico Family.

2nd Quarter Issues:

Minimum Staffing Requirements: 2020 Budget Discussion

Hiring Process and Promotion Process: A hiring process was completed in the 2nd quarter. A promotion process is being considered for the 4th quarter.

PLEAC Accreditation Process: New policies being implemented were discussed, to include Command Development, Body-worn Cameras, Body Alterations & Tattoos and Giglio.

2020 Budget Overview: General Discussion

3rd Quarter Issues:

No meeting was held during the 3rd Quarter. A third meeting will be scheduled in the 4th Quarter to close out or address all identified issues.

2. Establish a multi-disciplined community advisory committee for National Night Out. **Purpose:** Our objective will be to solicit input from our community partners to better represent the mission of the annual National Night Out event.

Status: The National Night Out event was held in the three regional communities on August 6, 2019. Details and images from the greatly successful event are included on Page 6.

3. Create a template for a 7-week Citizens' Police Academy. **Purpose:** Design and budget for a citizens' police academy for our residents to create a better understanding of the law enforcement role which will improve relations and our image.

Status: The Executive Division has established budget and draft program for a Citizen's Police Academy for the Fall of 2020.

4. Host an Open House for the new police facility. **Purpose:** To welcome and offer thanks to the public for their support for the new police facility.

Status: This objective was completed on September 21, 2019 following the dedication ceremony.

5. Direct appropriate resources to complete a detailed analysis and then report with recommendations on the following public safety concerns. **Purpose:** Our objective is to better understand these community issues and direct resources and enlist our community's assistance to disrupt, disband, displace or alter behaviors that put us at risk.

2019 Budget Commentary

The following is a summary to highlight the manageable areas of the 2019 budget; these numbers are accurate as of September 30, 2019.

Petty Cash Audit:

A 3rd quarter petty cash audit was performed by the Records Administrator. The audit revealed no discrepancies and accurately accounted for the on-hand petty cash of \$310.22. Purchase Orders are pending a 4th quarter reconcile for a final deposit into the account.

Part-time Salary – 01-410-144:

\$230,000.00 was budgeted for 2019 part-time salary expenses. To date, \$201,999.15 to pay for 7,240.50 hours has been disbursed. This represents 87.83% of the budget category. It should be

noted that our 40 hours of contract coverage in Avondale Borough has weighed on this category. Payment for services from Avondale appearing as revenue has offset the expenses.

Overtime Expenses – 01-410-183:

\$60,000.00 was budgeted for 2019 overtime expenses. To date, \$21,927.44 for 476.50 hours has been disbursed for various reasons. This expenditure total represents 36.55% of the budget category. It should be noted that \$11,494.99 of the total amount is related to an Extra Duty/Reimbursable Expense. To date, only 17.38% of the overtime budget has been used for department related activities.

Fleet Maintenance – 01-410-250:

\$25,000.00 was budgeted for fleet maintenance and repair expenses. To date, \$15,806.39 has been disbursed for a total of 99 maintenance or repair events. This expenditure total represents 63.22% of the budget category.

Contracted Services – 01-410-450:

\$68,000.00 was budgeted for contracted services expenses. To date, \$50,366.14 for eighty-four purchase orders. This expenditure total represents 74.07% of the budget category.

Grants and Awards

In previous reports, ACH deposits from grant awards were recorded in the revenue section. This was changed to accurately reflect that award monies confirmed by the Finance Director were accurately placed into their proper accounts.

COPS Hiring Award:

In 2018, the department received a COPS Hiring award for \$125,000.00 over a span of three-years. A total of \$44,785.00 is scheduled to drawdown in 2019 to offset the expenses of a police officer's salary and benefits. In the 1st Quarter, a payment request was submitted for \$11,196.25; an ACH was received in April of 2019. A second and third drawdown will occur in July and October respectively.

Targeted Safe Schools - SRO Award:

In 2019, the department received a PA Department of Education award for \$60,000.00 over a span of one-year to redeploy an employee to a School Resource Officer position in the schools in New Garden Township. The Kennett Consolidated School District contributed another \$26,475.00 towards the program, which was received in total from KCSD.

A 1st Quarter payment was received in the amount of \$39,199.41 from the Safe School Office. A 2nd Quarter payment totaling \$20,800.59 is pending.

ACH deposits will be confirmed with the Finance Director, but will not be recorded in the revenue report.

Bullet Resistant Vest Award:

The two payment requests from the Office of Justice for the purchase of five (5) bullet proof vests have been received in the amounts of \$2,218.00 and \$567.00 respectively.

ACH deposits will be confirmed with the Finance Director, but will not be recorded in the revenue report.

A 2019 BVP grant application was submitted and approved in the amount of \$2,406.50.

PCCD Award:

In 2018, efforts began to secure a grant for Body-Worm Camera in the amount of \$18,000.00. In April of 2019, the department received notice that we were successful in our endeavors. Plans are underway to purchase the equipment in the 4th Quarter with the grant and match dollars. Training of personnel will satisfy remaining match requirements with in-kind expenses.

Revenues and Awards:

The total revenue received through the 3rd Quarter is \$103,851.40; see data below for breakdown:

Avondale Borough

On July 1, 2019 at 0001 hours, the Southern Chester County Regional Police Department commenced law enforcement operations in Avondale Borough. See related data further in this report.

2020 Budget

On September 18, 2019, the Public Safety Commissioners adopted the 2020 preliminary budget. The estimated increase from 2019 to 2020 is 5%. Personnel costs and Contracted Service category are directly related to the increases. Following the budget deliberations, the PSC approved a Strategic Planning Committee tasked with researching future budget stabilization efforts.

Biased Based Policing

Consistent with the recommendations of the 2015 President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing, Pillar #1 --- Building Trust and Legitimacy, below is traffic stop demographic data for the 1st Quarter of 2019.

The department has also implemented a Best Practice Biased Based Policing Policy in compliance with Accreditation Standards.

Hispanic Population**




Figure 11: Male vs. Female Population





Figure 9: West Grove, Chester County, Pennsylvania, PA and Area Racial Makeup






Event Count by Type



The above outlines the vehicles in the department’s fleet and their current assignment. The number of miles driven by a police vehicle assigned to the patrol division is an average of 20,000-22,000 per year. The average longevity of a vehicle assigned to patrol is 5 years. Occasionally, a vehicle will be reassigned to a specialized position to prolong its projected longevity. According to this chart, the department will need to replace at least 3 vehicles out of the 14 within the next year. A strict preventative maintenance plan is in place to maximize the fleet’s effectiveness.


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Chester County Lethality Assessment Program 1st Quarter Heat Map July 1, 2019 –September 30, 2019



Core Values in Action

Supervisor Notations are internal reports filed by ranking officers who have either identified a positive interaction between a police officer and the public or have been informed of a job well done. Supervisor notations are a certain way to letting the department's police officers know that leadership is paying attention to actions which are considered going above and beyond to honor our values and philosophy. The notations are added in the officers personnel file for permanent record.

Lieutenant Joseph F. Greenwalt

Lt. Greenwalt received a Supervisor's Notation from Deputy Chief King for the positive impression that he made with family members at the scene of an opioid overdose in June. The mother of the deceased remarked favorably about the impact that his actions and demeanor had on her at that very difficult day by trying to keep her grounded and make her feel as comfortable as possible. In an excerpt from the S-Note, DC King remarked:

Unfortunately, OD death scenes are a far too common occurrence these days. There are typically high emotions at play, especially if the deceased is found by a family member or if family arrives at the scene while we are there. Our job starts when the victim's day ends in these cases and we have limited time to conduct the investigation, which involves gathering evidence, conducting interviews, and making every effort to identify to source of the deadly dose. Sometimes, we get so wrapped up in our mission that we lose sight of the human side of these tragedies. It is the surviving family members that must carry the burden of their loss. And, while they may want to see the person(s) responsible held to task, they must also accept that fact that the victim too, by virtue of their addiction, bears responsibility for their fate. Many family members tend to blame themselves for not being able to "reach" their loved ones or get them the help that could have saved them.

That being said, it is so very important that we don't forget to show the appropriate level of compassion and empathy towards the grieving family. We have an enormous responsibility in these cases to conduct a thorough and competent investigation but we also have an equally enormous opportunity to forever impact the lives of those touched by these tragedies, through simple actions of caring and compassion. You did just that at this scene and made a lasting impression on this family.

Special Operations Division

Administrative Shift Coverages

The Special Operations Division (which includes, the Criminal Investigations Unit, the Tactical Intelligence and Support Unit, and the Community Services Unit) cooperates with the Patrol Operations Division by assisting with uniformed patrol coverages. This not only maintains a balanced budget, but also ensures adequate staffing during peak leave request periods. This scheduling adjustment maintains a healthy stewardship over the overtime and part-time police officers budget areas. During the 3rd quarter of 2019, the SOD was not required to provide shift coverage.

Quality of Life

SOD Proactive Enforcement

The Tactical Intelligence and Support Unit augments patrol efforts by conducting surveillance and deploying resources in response to citizen complaints about crime, drug activity, and traffic violations.

Professional Standards

- There were no Internal Affairs Investigations during the 3rd quarter of 2019.
- There was one (1) Department Vehicle Accidents during the 3rd quarter of 2019 (DVA# 19-03).
- There was one (1) Supervisory Inquiry/Pursuit Review initiated in the 3rd quarter of 2019 (S.I. #19-05) with no policy violations found. Note: In accordance with Section 6343(a) of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, each police pursuit is submitted to the Pennsylvania Police Pursuit Reporting System (PPPRS).

3rd Quarter Use of Force Report & Review

A Use of Force Committee is put together each quarter to review all incidents submitted during that time period. The Deputy Chief serves as the committee chair person. On October 11, 2019, a Use of Force Review Board was convened and the following incidents were reviewed:

The below Use of Force report was submitted to document the destruction of an injured animal during the 3rd quarter. After thorough review, the actions of the officer were found to be in compliance with policy.

1. [RD-19-003032](#) (Deer)

The below incidents are circumstances where a force option was used and the officer's actions were found to be in compliance with Department Policy after review:

1. **RD-19-002602:** Police initiated a traffic stop of a suspect reported to be driving aggressively and acting in a manner consistent with “road rage”. As the officer made contact with the operator, he was continually interrupted and interfered with by the rear seat passenger. Despite several warnings to cease his interference or risk arrest, the passenger continued. When the officer had him exit the vehicle and attempted to handcuff him, the passenger resisted by pulling away and refusing to place his hands behind his back. Fearful that the passenger may have contraband or a weapon on his person, the officer shoved him against his patrol car and was then able to take him into custody. Once secured in the patrol car, the subject continued to thrash about. Both the driver and the passenger were arrested, processed, and later released. No injuries reported.
2. **RD-19-0029237:** Officers responded to a residence to serve a 302 Warrant for a Mental Health Commitment. They were cautioned that the subject could be extremely violent with police. When they made contact with the subject and attempted to take her into custody, she actively resisted by drawing back her fist in preparation for throwing a punch. Her arms were restrained by officers and she was placed in handcuffs. While being walked to a waiting ambulance, she kicked an officer several times in the legs and dropped to the ground. She continued to scream at officers and attempted to spit on them. While this was going on, a hostile crowd present on scene. The subject of the 302 Warrant calmed down once she was placed into the ambulance. She was transported to the hospital without further incident.

Significant Activity

Analysis of crime reporting data in the 3rd quarter of 2019 identified the following cases or crime trends as being noteworthy:

- **Tampering with or Fabricating Physical Evidence:** An investigation into the circumstances surrounding an opioid overdose resulted in a 25 year old suspect being charged. It was learned that he had dragged the overdose victim to the driveway of another residence, before he called 911 and then told the call taker that he did not know the identity of the victim, when in fact they were friends. The victim of the overdose survived.
- **Sex Offender Investigation:** An investigation was initiated after receipt of a CY47 report that alleged possible child pornography on the computer of a convicted sex offender. Two separate Search Warrants were executed at two locations controlled by the suspect. Numerous items were seized but no evidence of criminal activity was discovered. The investigation was closed as unfounded. SCCPRD investigators were assisted by the Kennett Square and Kennett Township Police Departments and by the Chester County Detectives.
- **Indecent Assault:** A previously reported CY 47/104 case from April was reclassified as a criminal offense and was cleared by the arrest of a juvenile.
- **Burglary/Auto Theft:** The CIU took over an investigation into the theft of a former septic truck from a mushroom business. The vehicle was later found crashed and abandoned in Wilmington, where it was recovered. The case was cleared with the arrest of a 40-year-old male.

- **Sexual Assault:** A previously reported CY 47/104 case was reclassified as a criminal offense and was cleared with the arrest of a 52-year-old male.
- **Reports of Suspected Child Abuse (CY 47/104):** In 3rd quarter of 2019, the CIU received (7) reports of suspected Child Abuse (physical and sexual). Four of these were determined to be “unfounded” for criminal offenses. The remaining three cases are still under investigation.

Criminal Investigation Unit Staffing

Cpl. Jason Ward is assigned to the CIU as the primary investigator. He receives investigative assistance and technical support from Det. Stephen Madonna, who performs CIU and Intelligence functions.

Both investigators are assigned to the Chester County Municipal Drug Task Force (MDTF) and Det. Madonna is also assigned to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Task Force.

Additionally, P.O. Richard Townsend provides occasional CIU coverage when both investigators are unavailable, due to training or court, and he provides assistance with forensic expertise and evidence processing.


Crime and Intelligence Information Sharing

CIU investigators work closely with their counterparts in our neighboring jurisdictions. We share information on active investigations at monthly or bi-monthly crime meetings, which are hosted on a rotational basis. SCCRPD investigators attended a meeting hosted by the Kennett Township PD in July but investigative and operational priorities negated their ability to attend the meeting in August. These meetings are often attended by investigators from agencies in DE and MD, as well as by federal law enforcement agents.

Summer Intern Program

Technology in Use

Unmanned Aircraft

The Department's Unmanned Aircraft (Drone) was used to augment patrol efforts, as SCCRPD Officers and PSP Troopers searched for a suspect who fled his vehicle on foot, after a pursuit through Avondale Borough in September. The suspect was captured after an alert resident called police about suspicious activity near his house.



Two new pieces of equipment were added to the Department's arsenal of investigative resources. These will aid investigators in the processing of physical evidence for latent fingerprints and will hopefully contribute to the solving of crimes.



Safefume™

The Safefume™ cyanoacrylate fuming chamber by Air Science is designed to safely develop latent fingerprints using ethyl cyanoacrylate (CNA) vapor in a controlled environment for optimum effectiveness and safety where moisture and fuming time are critical factors. The tamper resistant compartment helps maintain the chain of custody. The unique filtration system offers personnel protection during use.

Ductless Downflow Workstation

The Ductless Downflow Workstation by Air Science is a high efficiency ductless fume hood designed to protect the user and the environment from hazardous vapors generated on the work surface. Unrestricted front and side access to the ductless workstation facilitates applications requiring complex and intensive operator involvement, while downward airflow in the chamber protects the operator.
