## Introduction

## Executive Division

The Executive Division is overseen by the Chief of Police. This Division is responsible for all operational components; Personnel, administrative, budgetary, and personnel matters in the organization.

The Executive Division is comprised of the Chief of Police, Executive Assistant, Records Administrator, Manager, Patrol, and Administration Commanders, and the Police Chaplain.

## Criminal Investigation Division

The Criminal Investigations Division is overseen by the Administrative Lieutenant. The Criminal Investigations Division is responsible for Criminal Investigations, Intelligence and Support, Community Services, Training, Staff Services, and Professional Standards. The Criminal Investigations Division is assisted by the Chief's Executive Assistant, who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

## Patrol Division

The Patrol Division is overseen by the Lieutenant. The Patrol Division is responsible for all Field Operations and is the direct supervisor of the Platoon Corporals. The Patrol Division is assisted by the Chief's Records Administrator, who serves as a member of the Command Staff.

## Communication from the Five Corners (5 C's)

### The Chief's Corner

On the morning of September 11, 2001, I was working in my office at the City of Newark when a co-worker yelled at me from across the hallway that his wife had called and told him that a plane just struck one of the World Trade Towers.

Like so many across this Nation, we all know where we were and what we were doing when we learned about the terrorist events that were unfolding. I think the hard thing for some of us to believe is that it has been twenty years since that faithful day. I for one, question if we have made any progress towards a safer and more peaceful world in the years following.

I have visited all of the memorial sites, with the first being Ground Zero in June of 2002. It's sad to say that during that time, the workers were still finding the remains of the 2,753 victims lost in New York. And, twenty years later, work still continues to identify the victims.

I have been to the Flight 93 Memorial at least nine times. From the time when there was nothing more than a few benches, makeshift memorials, and a chain-link fence around the site to its completed stage. Today, there is a visitor's center and a marble wall marking the flight path along with the engraved names of the victims. It stands there to remind us that the passengers on Flight 93 were the first to take the fight to this enemy saving countless souls at an unknown target. The picture above is from a visit in 2007 when I attached my former agencies' patch to a makeshift memorial. The latter picture was from a visit in March of this year.



In 2010, I visited the Pentagon site with a friend who was serving in the Military. During that visit, I found the engraved name of AG2 Matthew M. Flocco, who was from Newark, DE. He was serving in the USN stationed at the Pentagon when he died.

As I approached the 20-year anniversary, I found myself in moments of deep reflection. So much has been lost, but we have persevered --- life goes on in some fashion for all us impacted by these horrific events. One thing is certain; we must Never Forget the 2,977 innocent souls who perished that faithful day. The question is,

for each of us, has the time have come for us to forgive? I suspect more reflection is required for many of us to reach the answer to that question...

I married my best friend ten years ago and have never been so lucky in my life. My wife has stood beside me through all the rough. She says it all the time "It's not easy being a police wife", but she is one strong woman that has handled so much. I am a father of three amazing kids. Kids that will also feel the pain of being the children of a Police Officer, but those small innocent minds have a long time before they will have to worry about that. I attend family functions, birthdays, holidays, vacations, and at times, in this line of work, I will miss those special events, but I still choose to pin on that badge. I have stress as any normal man does. I have good days and bad. I have feelings that get hurt. But, I am a normal human being. I am more than just a cop.

The reason I chose this life style was not for the "fame and glory" that many people may think. This job is far from fame and glory. I chose this field because I always wanted to be a cop. It was a calling. I knew at a young age this is what I wanted. Believe it or not, I have 25 years as a first responder. I started as a firefighter, became an EMT, and finally followed my dreams of becoming a cop. I love the satisfaction of doing what is right, serving the community, and building solid relationships with the residents I serve. Just being and doing what I had always dreamed of is the true reason why I never hesitate to pin on my badge.

As a member of the Community Advisory Board I can say we are impressed with how well the SCCRPD performs. A lot is asked of our local police department and one of the major challenges is that it should look like us. That means we should have officers that speak English, and Spanish, are men and women and it would be great if one or two were even second generation from Mexico or even Moroleon. Now that sounds good when you say it fast, but where do you get these fine people with these qualifications? A young woman whose parents moved here from Moroleon? There are over 250 of them in the Kennett School district. And we have a program to develop that talent.

We are meeting them with a uniformed officer when they get off the school bus in kindergarten and at the middle school and developing programs for them in the high school so they will consider majoring in Criminal Justice at a school like West Chester or Penn State. But then we have to compete with the FBI and Pennsylvania State police for their employment. It is a work in progress as we shape a future where our police department speaks to the condition of the entire community.

## Chaplain's Corner

We all know that law enforcement is a dangerous occupation. Law enforcement is more challenging than ever. Law enforcement professionals confront the grim realities of a society struggling with the specter of violence in every aspect of life. Policing this violence-tinged society are law enforcement

officers. Standing tall, they confront not the made-for-TV world of violence but the real world of death and destruction. Inevitably, these officers acquire psychological baggage and trauma. More officers die by suicide than any other way. To date, in 2021, 116 law enforcement officers have died by suicide. (The number is probably higher, as some departments and families report the death as something else due to the stigma involved). Many reasons contribute to this high number. Policing involves exposure to human misery, negative public image, and death. Police rarely interact with folks having their best day. Police officers experience upsetting events at work more than any other profession. They suffer from burnout and compassion fatigue.

Law enforcement officers also suffer from maladaptive coping strategies and the stigma surrounding suicide, mental health, and asking for help remains strong. Attitudes must change so that statistics decline. We must study the phenomena of law enforcement stress more. I am happy to say that SCCRPD is addressing these issues. Continuing education seminars on wholeness and health are provided, referral services offered, and speaking to the Police Chaplain is encouraged.

I am pleased to assist Chief Simpson and the SCCRPD in facing this critical issue in the lives of our police officers. I have spent many hours in continuing education, learning about the trauma-specific to law enforcement. I have many tools and resources to offer our brave men and women who have answered the call to "serve and protect". We, as a community, must work towards serving and protecting them, as well.

An antidote to suicide is hope – hope that tomorrow can be better than today. Let us hope together to build resilience and work from post-traumatic stress to post-traumatic growth. I got into this line of work the same way most police officers came to the job – I was called to it. I believe I can support the brave officers of the SCCRPC in their search for health and holism. I can offer my skills, training, and passion to them. It is an honor to serve alongside this great group of dedicated law enforcement professionals.

### 2021 SMART Goals

**Status:**      The CAB has met on two occasions during the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter. The CAB is in the process of forming their Vision Statement, Mission Statement, and Core Values.      **Status: Active**

#### Goal #2:      **Recruitment and Retention Committee**

**Purpose:**      SCCRPD has formed a R&R Committee chaired by the Public Safety Commissioner's chairperson, Mayor Stephen Black. The committee is comprised of department personnel and community stakeholders. The committee is charged with analyzing current recruitment efforts and making recommendations to address the current lack of diversity.

**Status:**      The Chief of Police has revised the Recruitment and Retention policy to include a Cadet program as a means for increasing diverse hiring.      **Status: Active**

#### Goal #3:      **Finance Committee**

**Purpose:**      SCCRPD has formed a Finance Committee chaired by the Public Safety Commissioner, Stephen Allaband. The committee is comprised of Command Staff personnel, Management, and community stakeholders. The committee is charged with analyzing current financial trends to make recommendations to address identified areas.

**Status:**      The committee is paused to await 2022 budget projects.      **Status: Active**

#### Goal #4:      **C.R.A.S.E. Training Program**

**Purpose:**      Provide a valid active-threat response training program to the public, commercial enterprises, private organizations, religious institutions, and other community stakeholders.

**Status:** This goal is in the planning stages with the intention of offering the program to our residents in the late summer. **Status: Pending**

**Goal #5: NJSACOP Command & Leadership Academy**

**Purpose:** Open a Chester County site for the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police – Command & Leadership Academy.

**Status:** The objective is ongoing. **Status: Complete**

**Goal #6: Crimewatch Labs**

**Purpose:** Perform analysis on department data, to include traffic collisions and stops, crime, and other pertinent information to better comprehend information and use it towards predicting trends.

**Status:** This goal is pending the migration of data from Cody/RMS. **Status: Pending**

**Goal #7: Police Trading Card Initiative**

**Purpose:** Initiate the Police Trading Cards Program. Purchased with the assistance of a benefactor, Basciani Foods, SCCRPD is looking to create positive interactions between the communities' youth and police officers.

**Status:** This program has concluded. **Status: Complete**

**Goal #8: Community Relations Survey**

**Purpose:** Provide a bilingual survey to measure the partnered communities' perceptions of service accessibility, quality of service, perception of crime and traffic issues, etc.

**Status:** This goal is in the planning stages with the intention of releasing the survey in the early-mid Fall. **Status: Active**

The following is a summary to highlight the manageable areas of the budget. The numbers are accurate as of September 30, 2021.

#### Leave Liability Audit

On October 1, 2021, an audit of personnel leave inventory was completed with the New Garden Township's payroll department. No discrepancies were found.

#### Petty Cash Audit

On October 1, 2021, an audit was conducted by Heather Campbell of the on-hand petty cash fund which revealed no discrepancies. A total of ten (10) transactions occurred from three (3) budget areas during the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter of 2021. Receipts for the transactions were submitted to the Finance Department for reimbursement in the amount of \$253.94. The total on-hand petty cash amount is \$397.12.

#### Part-time Salary – 01-410-144

\$250,00.00 was budgeted for 2021 part-time salary expenses. An estimated total of \$163,527.00 has been disbursed through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter for an approximate 5,670.50 hours of coverage. These expenditures represent 65.42% of the part-time wage budget.

#### Overtime Expenses – 01-410-183

\$50,000.00 was budgeted for 2021 overtime expenses. An approximate total of \$20,693.23 for 432 overtime hours has been disbursed through the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter work for performed in ten (10) of the eleven (11) authorized categories. These expenditures represent 41.39% of the overtime wage budget. It should be noted that 135 hours of work performed occurred in the Extra-Duty Vendor category, which is reimbursed back to the police department.

#### Fleet Maintenance – 01-410-250

\$25,000.00 was budgeted for fleet maintenance and repair expenses. An estimated total of \$11,309.06 was disbursed for ninety-nine (99) maintenance or repair events. These expenditures represent 45.24% of the fleet maintenance budget.

#### Non-Personnel Insurances – 01-410-352-356

A total of \$120,978.00 was budgeted in four the non-personnel insurance categories. To date for facility related utilities. A total of \$129,332.00 has been disbursed. These expenditures represent 106.91% of the areas affected.

#### Building Utilities – 01-410-360

\$18,000.00 was budgeted for facility related utilities. A total of \$11,288.93 was disbursed for twenty-five (25) invoices. These expenditures represent 62.72% of the utility budget.

### Contracted Services – 01-410-450

\$90,000.00 was budgeted for contracted services expenses. A total of \$50,135.03 was disbursed for one-hundred (100) contracted services. These expenditures represent 55.71% of the contract services budget.



### Event Count by Hour of the Day





## Event Count by Municipality



## County Highway Safety Project

The Southern Chester County Regional Police Department was awarded a grant from the Chester County Highway Safety Project to enforce aggressive driving behaviors. The grant period is designed to influence driving habits before we enter into the summer driving season and thus reduce collisions. In the first Quarter of 2021 alone, the Southern Chester County Regional Police Department reported an overall increase in traffic collisions of almost 8% when compared to this period last year.



It is our hope that with our efforts to enforce speeding, tailgating, disregard of traffic control signals, and related aggressive driving patterns, we can influence driving behaviors to reduce serious collisions and keep the motoring and pedestrian traffic safe in our jurisdiction.

We ask that motorists continue to be mindful of the posted speed limits and related aggressive driving behaviors. Together, we can reduce the likelihood of a continued increase in traffic collisions.

Below are the results from several selective enforcement details conducted in our coverage areas during this Aggressive Driving grant period that took place during the 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter of 2021. The areas selected to conduct these details are based on speed studies and accident data collected by this agency.

## Traffic Safety Unit


### Speed Signs

Motorists have probably noticed that dynamic speed limit/radar signs have been set up on roadways within our jurisdiction. The decision to purchase the signs was a result of an increase in complaints received for speeding on some of our primary and secondary roadways. As drivers approach the sign, it will display their current speed and give drivers a reminder to self-correct their speed in lieu of continuing at that rate and receiving a citation, or even worse, end up in a traffic collision or strike a pedestrian. The signs are moveable and will be placed in areas where crashes and speeding are a legitimate concern. The signs also collect much-needed data making it possible for us to further identify problem areas where enforcement may be a necessity. With the placement of the new signs, the department asks motorists to cooperate with our mission by simply slowing down, which will result in safer roadways for all of us.



At the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter, we have placed Speed Signs at two (2) separate locations in our communities. The data they collect will be released in the Annual Report. Our 3<sup>rd</sup> Speed Sign is in the process of being shipped back to the manufacturer for repair.

### Chart for NB lane of the 200 Block of South Guernsey Rd., West Grove Borough



A total of 110,147 vehicles were captured in the NB lane of the 100 block of South Guernsey Rd., West Grove Borough during the posted period of June 17<sup>th</sup> through September 13<sup>th</sup> 2021 (89 days). A majority (68,028 or 61.77%) were traveling at/less than 35 mph in the posted 25 mph zone when approaching the sign. There were 42,119 vehicles (38.25%) traveling at a speed greater than 35 mph, whose speed would be enforceable under the PA Vehicle Code. *The statistics show that there is a speeding problem on this roadway.*

The date and time data, for speeding violations, will be analyzed in order to determine the best time for targeted speed enforcement. If you travel this roadway, slow down or face the possible consequences.

### **New Garden Township Traffic Committee**

Lieutenant Ward is assigned to the New Garden Township Traffic Committee launched by Township Manager Ramsey Reiner this year. Also on the committee is New Garden Township Road Master Kenneth Reed and traffic engineers from McMahon Transportation Engineers. Issues regarding roads and traffic complaints have been addressed quickly and more efficiently since the committee's inception. The department looks forward to maintaining a position on the committee since the joint effort approach leads to rapid and permanent solutions to concerns and areas needing improvement. Meetings are usually held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday of each month.



### **Commercial Vehicle Inspections**

Commercial Vehicle traffic on our local roadways is ever present. As to their nature, Commercial Vehicles pose a safety risk to all travelers on our local roadways. Because of this, PennDot (PA Department of Transportation), provides training, for select few officers, to enforce commercial vehicle standards. The SCCRPD is proud to have Traffic Safety Officer Ray Sullivan fulfilling that role. During the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter, TSO Ray Sullivan conducted 18 Commercial Vehicle Inspections. There were 16 Commercial Vehicle violations issued by TSO Sullivan. Four (4) commercial vehicles were placed "Out of Service" due to equipment violations or other hazardous equipment conditions.

### Police Pursuit Incidents

In the 3rd quarter of 2021, there was one (1) police pursuit incident (PR #21-02). On Sunday 18 July 2021, SCCRPD received information through Chester County Police Radio (CCPR), that there was reliable information for the presence of a stolen vehicle in the area of Gap Newport Pike and Newark Rd. This vehicle was reported stolen out of Virginia by means of an armed carjacking.


SCCRPD began to check the area, and, after approximately 5 minutes, did locate the described vehicle, heading southbound on Newark Rd. The vehicle eventually turned onto northbound Sunny Dell Rd. At this time, SCCRPD officers did confirm the identity of the stolen vehicle through CCPR. SCCRPD officers initiated a traffic stop, to which the suspect vehicle began to flee our officers.

The pursuit continued onto southbound Gap Newport Pike. SCCRPD officers notified CCPR that the vehicle was headed towards the DE state line. The stolen vehicle did enter the state of DE a short time thereafter. The pursuit, on the SCCRPD end, was terminated once the stolen vehicle crossed into DE, where there were DE law enforcement officers present. DE law enforcement then continued the pursuit. A review of the pursuit showed that all SCCRPD officers followed our Departments Pursuit Policy without any violations. There were no injuries to bystanders or officers, and no vehicles were damaged.

In the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter of 2021, the department had a total of three (3) Police Vehicle collisions. In the first collision, the police vehicle sustained major damage to the exhaust system due to being driven over some rocks. This vehicle was out of service for an extended period of time before being returned to patrol. The second involved an unattended Police vehicle which was struck by another emergency vehicle (ambulance). The unattended police vehicle that was struck received cosmetic damage. In the third collision, the police vehicle was inadvertently backed into a light post and sustained minor body and tire rim damage. No officers were injured in any of these collisions.



## Response to Resistance Review

On Thursday 30 September 2021, the Response to Resistance Review Committee was convened to review the 3rd quarter use of force incidents. The committee was chaired by Lt. Jason Ward accompanied by Corporal Stephen Madonna, and P.O. Greg Blue. Cpl. Madonna and P.O. Blue recused themselves from reviewing one (1) Response to Resistance incident due their involvement in the incident. The incident involving these two officers was reviewed on Monday 04 October 2021, by Lt. Ward, Cpl. Joseph Versagli, and CRO Stephen Syska.

The committees reviewed two (2) Response to Resistance incidents, both of which involved two (2) police officers. Both Response to Resistance incidents passed through the committee's review without comment or recommendation, all being found compliant with department policy.
